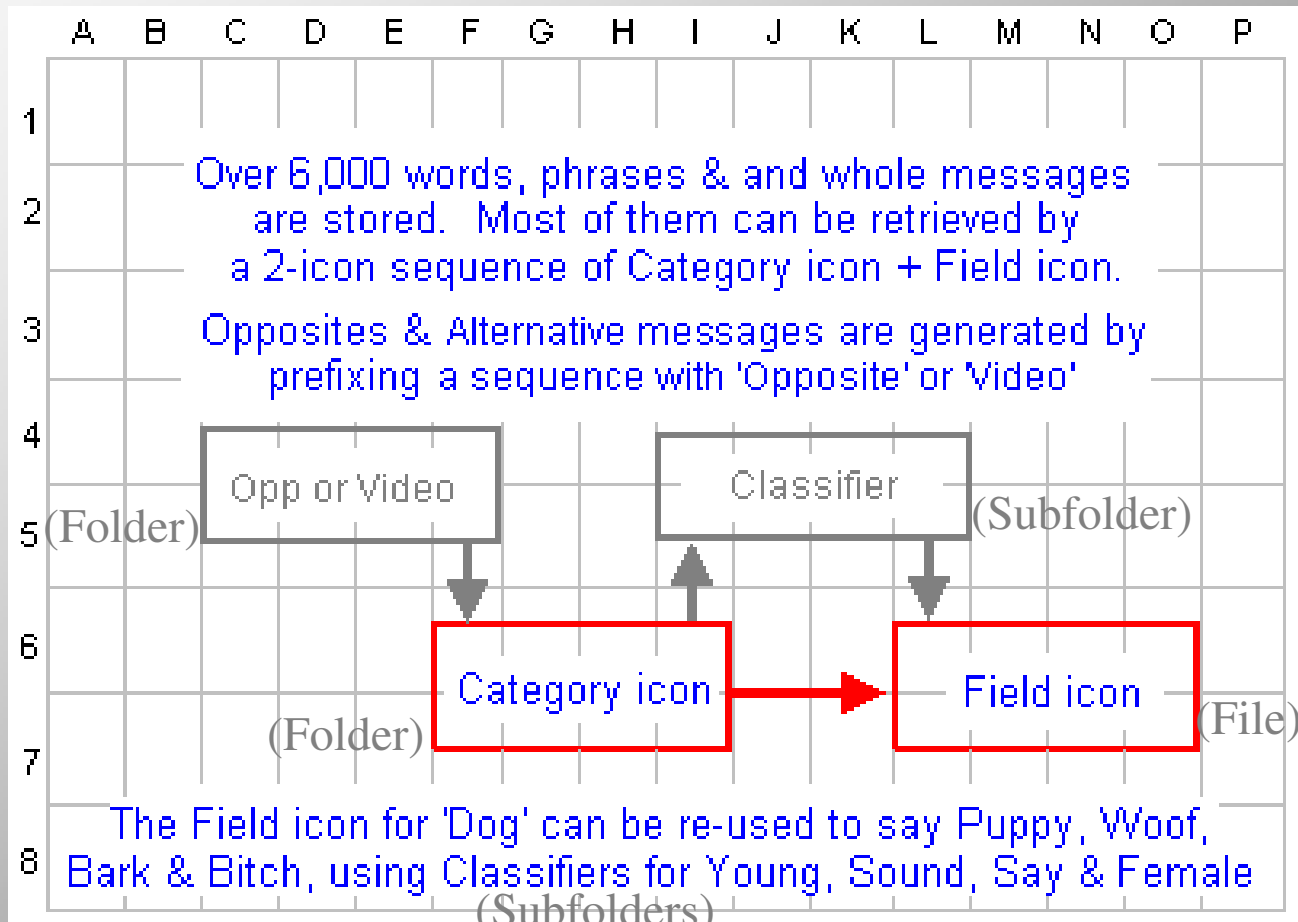

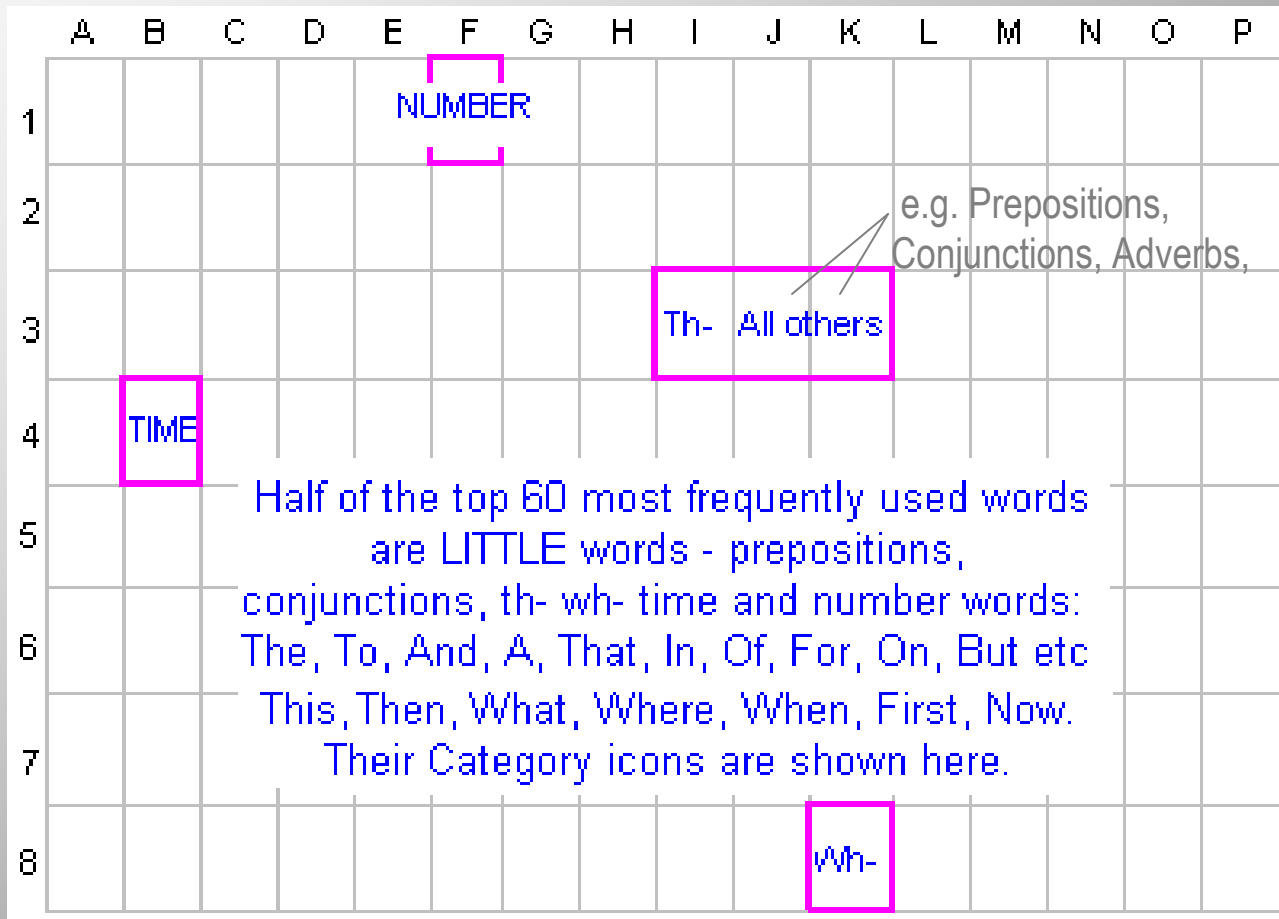
Selecting Elf or Label as the Category icon,

Selecting one of these green keys, as a Category icon,
and then any other key, as a Field icon, generates a
particular tense of the verb stored in the Field cell:
e.g. Do, Does, Did, Done, To do, Doing

The Category icons to access the four forms are shown, e.g. Old, Older, Oldest, Maturely, Good, Better, Best, Godly, Same, More of the Same, Mostly the Same, Similarly

OPPOSITE

Many words have opposites.
 Opposites of any tense of a verb are generated by
 prefixing the usual Category + Field icon sequence
 with the 'Operator' icon, OPPOSITE.
 e.g. Haven't, Don't, Won't, Aren't, Wouldn't, Can't
 Hasn't, Didn't, Weren't, Isn't, Wasn't

Nouns

2		Name	There are 57 Categories of nouns stored under the usual Category + Field sequences.													
3		Although numerous in our language, there were only 6 nouns in the top 100 list, and 38 in the top 300.														
4		And the top 300 words = 80%+ of daily speech. The top 25 words alone = 45%.														
5		Name, Cell B2, accesses nouns that tend to be the generic names of groups of nouns like People, Place, Body, Animal... Their Field Icons are the Category Icons that access each of these generic noun groups.

8		Most, but not all, noun categories are in Rows 5 - 8.														

Whole Messages

1	Evidence has shown that proficient AAC communicators															
2	use pre-stored sentences for as little as 2% of their daily															
3	communication. They may use them to enhance															
4	communication rate, serve routine, frequent & emergency															
5	needs; and to initiate and maintain a conversation.															
6																
7	There are four categories of pre-stored message in LLL as															
8	default. Try pressing the icons 'Witch', 'Judge', 'Knot'															
	or 'Bottom' and then any other icon!
